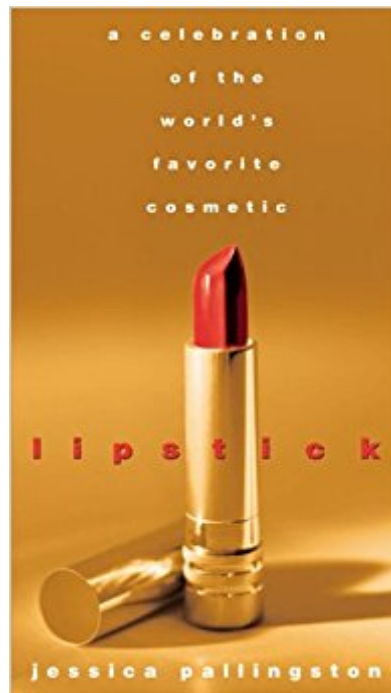




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Lipstick: A Celebration Of The World's Favorite Cosmetic
