

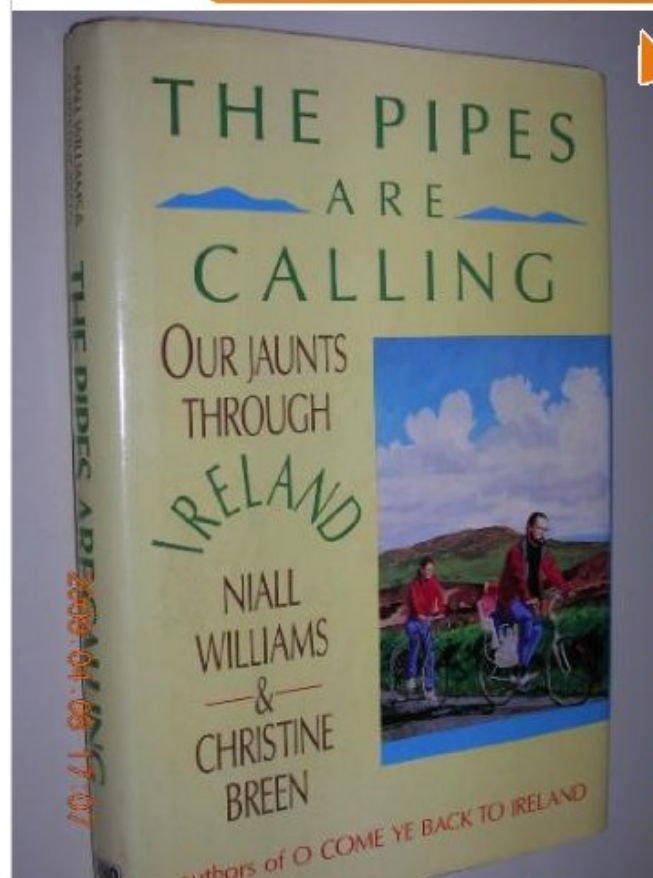


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The Pipes Are Calling: Our Jaunts Through Ireland

Accompanied by their adopted daughter, Deirdre, they take off from their base at Kiltumper Cottage to explore parts of Ireland lying to the west. They revisit favorite idylls, as well as popular attractions such as the Kerry Puck Fair, but the heart of their jaunting is in the remote islands, lonely seacoasts and primeval beaches that they delightedly come upon in Ulster. The continuing annals of County Clare. The first volume (*O Come Ye Back to Ireland*, LJ 10/15/87) chronicled a young couple's flight from Manhattan skyscraper to Irish cottage; the second (*When Summer's in the Meadow*, 2/15/89) added baby Deirdre; and this latest installment tells of forays with child across the Emerald Isle. The authors are superb surrogates for armchair tourists amused by an Ireland that is unfailingly charming in an invariably preindustrial sort of way. The latest is irresistible for the now identifiable Williams/Breen prose dialog recounting travel through familiar places (Dublin, Kerry, etc.) in a familiar manner (bed-and-breakfast). More volumes will no doubt

This is a rather different style of travelogue about a couple and their new daughter exploring Ireland from their home base in County Clare in western Ireland. The book takes place over the year of 1989 and loosely centers around the question "is Irish hospitality still alive". As one would expect,

they come to the conclusion, over the course of their journeys, that it is. I found the individual stories to be well written and interesting, but the overall book left me wanting a little more about the places they visited and less about "then we went there and did this". I myself also lacked enough Irish geography to always picture where they traveled. The chapters center around their trips to various parts of Ireland and focus on the hospitality they find at the various bed & breakfasts at which they stay. They observe a lot of interesting cultural events from a community dance, to street music festival, to a grayhound race to a horse fair. It is an interestingly eclectic mix that often surprised me. If you have been to Ireland or have connections there, I suspect you will find this an interesting book as it touches upon places than you have a connection to. For me, I will be looking for other authors' travelogues.

This book is truly a magnificent piece of writing. Niall Williams and Christine Breen describe their jaunts with their daughter Deirdre so clearly that you are with them in their car as they experience the excitement as they travel the back roads of Ireland -- all of the sights, smells, sounds and feelings of the different places they travel to, and best of all their life back home in Kiltumper. They fill the book with wonderful homey anecdotes about their travels, life at their farm and with their neighbors. Stories that not only open the door into their lives, but welcome you in with a steaming mug of tea and a hearty slice of Christine's Brown Bread.
