I actually met the author before I read his book. I was so amazed and intrigued after speaking with
him I was elated to stumble upon his book. It did not disappoint, it is an incredible glimpse into the
life of a WWII fighter pilot. I've already purchased the kindle version but I am going to order the
hardcover as well. I am certain I'll read it again.

This an excellent account of a few months in the spring and summer of 1943 in Northern African theater. The author flew p38's with the 71st squadron and tells it like it was.

I read my first military book sometime around the 6th grade, inspired by mock air attacks on our little desert town of El Centro, California. Corsair fighters stationed at the Naval Air Station in Seeley swooped and buzzed the town for several minutes and had children all over town running out into the streets to see what was happening. I'll never forget the one who singled me out. He pointed his nose right at me and did not pull up until he was about fifty feet over my head. I'll also never forget that distinctive gull wing of the plane and the smile on the pilot's face. It was close to the end of the Korean War and we were all dutifully ducking and covering to the regular sound of nuclear attack warnings. From that point on, I could not get enough of air combat histories, vowing that one day I would join their ranks to do my duty. I ended up reading hundreds of them, including both fictional and non-fiction historical books. At some point, I began to realize that all of the stories were being written by American and British authors, and wondered when we would start hearing from our old enemies. Finally, Adolph Galland, Eric Hartman and numerous other German WWII pilots began to stand up to tell their own stories. Then, Japanese pilots decided to break the rules and tell of their own experiences. Finally, one man, Tameichi Hara, wrote what I consider the best non-fiction account of the Pacific war and the Japanese navy's actions during the conflict. He had fought in virtually every naval battle in the South Pacific as captain of the destroyer, "Shigure;" the man who invented modern torpedo doctrine, and somehow managed to survive. All this humanized the enemy to me, and brought me to understand that no matter what politicians have to say during wartime, there will always be another side. Often times, we are victims of our own internal views, such as those inflicted on Fred Arnold by men trained to hate, usually for reasons even they do not understand. We see a little of that now as a retired officer or two in the Air Force take offense at a combat veteran turning his own experiences into a novel, a work of fiction that incorporates a few of the experiences of others in order to make the story come alive. I heard no complaints from the author of "Flight of the Intruder," who having been an naval aviator created a masterpiece of fiction about the Vietnam War. As long as the work is described and explained as fiction, including the heroism of others, it is just fine. My dream of becoming a fighter pilot never came to fruition. I became a police officer, then a probation officer, a lawyer, juvenile court referee, a writing instructor and finally retired to write novels. I now have four, the last one, "Charming Billy," a mixture of romance and air combat during the Battle of Britain. I have a pilot's license and so was able to write effectively about flight and the nature of that battle. I think that is what Fred Arnold has done, very

well I might add. He has put it all down on paper before the memories drift away. I give this novel five stars regardless of some of the formatting errors that were present in the Kindle version. At the time Mr. Arnold wrote it, the software was not up to the task of catching and correcting them.

Wrap-around errors were common, as were uncaught typos. People should hire professionals to do this work and not attempt to edit them by themselves. There are now many very good companies who will do this for writers and I encourage all take advantage of their skills. My last novel was edited and uploaded by an Australian lady, Patti Roberts of Queensland. Her skill at creating beautiful book covers is unsurpassed and her pricing is outstanding.
