


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# National Geographic Trails Illustrated - Grand Canyon East Map - AZ



## Customer Reviews

We just moved to the area for work in the National Park Service. Of course the park has excellent maps, however National Geographic meets and exceeds those! The map has clear images of trails and trailheads, including campsites and other points of interest. The map also includes Curecanti National Recreation Area, the neighboring park. This map is waterproof and has so far stood up to the cold and snowy Gunnison winter. I can't wait for the snow to thaw and to finally be able to explore this area in the summer. I'll update this review in the summer after the trails thaw and I can check them out!

This map is a bit too "big picture" to be usable for hiking. I would definately recommend getting the more detailed maps for the various districts over this map. I really didn't use this map for our trip - I used the Needles District map for our hikes in that area, and would assume that the other districts are as well mapped...

We went to Utah and visited several National Parks. These maps were great. We did several 15 mile hikes and 40 mile bike rides, without these maps we would have gotten lost. They are very detailed and help you stay on course. Canyonlands was our favorite - it has really nice amenities for camping. It is 40 miles off the beaten path but well worth the visit.

I am an experienced backpacker in the Grand Canyon, and I decided it would be good to get a new map. One thing that is different from the previous Nat Geo maps is that the Grand Canyon is broken into 2 separate maps, this one and Grand Canyon West #263. One huge advantage to having 2 maps is that the northern and eastern parts of the Canyon are now shown. This means that the following trails are now shown: the Arizona Trail (the part that goes through the South and North Kaibab Trails is shown entirely, with some northern parts shown up to North Larkum Canyon), North Canyon Trail, South Canyon Trail, and the Nankoweap Trail (now shown entirely, including the portion that climbs Saddle Mountain). Other areas that are now shown include the Kaibab Plateau, Walhalla Plateau, the Saddle Mountain Wilderness, the Vermillion Cliffs, Paria Canyon, and the southern portion of the Glen Canyon Rec Area. Some negatives to this map is that it lacks a few things. Clear Creek Trail is not shown (which surprised me since it was on the previous Nat Geo map) and some waterfalls/arches/caves aren't marked. Other than that, the map provides a lot of information about hiking in the Canyon and I highly recommend it to any Grand Canyon hiker.

My hiking son-in-law who is also a part-time guide at the Grand Canyon is extremely happy with this map. He says National Geographic makes the best maps--clear, practical, and include all the important features he would need. He's one happy camper!

I liked the previous version better that had Needles on one side, Island In The Sky on the other. This one jams it all on one side.

Very nice, detailed map of the area. Best of all, it is waterproof!

Meh. Was really looking for much more information about Havasupai trail on this one, i.e.: distance, rating, some description like the Grand Canyon map I have for the national park. But it's woefully devoid of such detail.

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
