


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# North Of Reliance



## **Synopsis**

This is home. It is easy enough to locate on paper, or in one's imagination, but on the inconvenient sprawling earth it is difficult to reach. The commute to the nearest town, Yellowknife, is 210 miles of wilderness lakes and trails, home to wolverine and caribou. Here's the story of why Dave and his wife, Kristen, came to choose this life, how they built a homestead and found ways to make a living, and what that choice has meant to the people they have become. Whether dogsledding across Great Slave Lake at 60 below, musing philosophically on the values of a northern life, visiting the nearest neighbors 10 miles away, or piloting a bush plane over millions of acres that rarely feel a human footprint, Dave shares both ordinary and life-changing moments with humor, insight, and really good writing.

He writes in the tradition (and standard) of Thoreau, Muir, Leopold, Eisley, Abbey, Dillard, Stegner, Berry and Snyder, but his perspective of the subject is as different from any of theirs as, say, his lifestyle is different from yours or mine. After all, Olesen and his wife, Kristen, their two daughters and three dozen husky dogs live north of Reliance on an isolated homestead he built himself by Great Slave Lake next to the Hoarfrost River in Canada s Northwest Territories. Average winter nighttime temperatures are below -20F and there are five hours of daylight in December. He makes a living as a bush pilot and guide, provides most of his family s food by hunting, and for recreation is a dog musher with eight Iditarod finishes and solo trips into the northwest of up to 500 miles, just Olesen and his dogs and whatever is encountered in that vast, sparsely populated (by humans) landscape. But his passion is the written word and using literature to illustrate the culture and tradition of man s relationship with nature, in the case of North of Reliance , that of a self-sufficient family life in a landscape as rich as it is sparse, as nourishing as it is unforgiving, all of it entwined with the web of life on earth. As mentioned, no one writes about these things like Olesen. My favorite section of the book is about Esker, the wolf Olesen kidnapped from its den as a puppy and raised as a cultivated member of his pack of huskies. He learned a great deal from Esker about the wild and the domesticated, nature and civilization, and how even the most gentle, well-intentioned touch of man disturbs the fragile balance of Earth s ecology. This is a book about adventure, a lovely family, the environment and poetic introspection about what matters. Dave Olesen was born in 1957 in Illinois. From there his life moved steadily northwest through his teens and twenties. He was educated at the University of Montana and Northland College. Before

immigrating to Canada, Olesen lived in northern Minnesota and worked as a guide, Outward Bound instructor, dog musher, and pilot. In July 1987 he was on board a local freighter eastbound from Yellowknife. On board were his nineteen huskies, his father Jim, and a seven-ton cargo of building material, fuel, food, and tools. 210 miles out along the coast of Great Slave Lake the fifth largest lake in North America the boat dropped anchor and offloaded Dave, his father, and his gear and dogs. There, ten miles from the tundra and ten miles north of a tiny outpost called Reliance, Dave took up his life. That autumn he was joined by Kristen Gilbertson; they married in 1989. They have two daughters. Dave and Kristen still live at the mouth of the Hoarfrost River, where they operate a small air charter and outfitting business. In 2014 their home was destroyed by wildfire. They are re-building. Dave is the author of three other books: *A Wonderful Country: The Quetico-Superior Stories of Bill Magie*; *Cold Nights, Fast Trails: Reflections of a Modern Dog Musher*; and most recently (2014) *Kinds of Winter: Four Solo Journeys by Dogteam in Canada's Northwest Territories*

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
