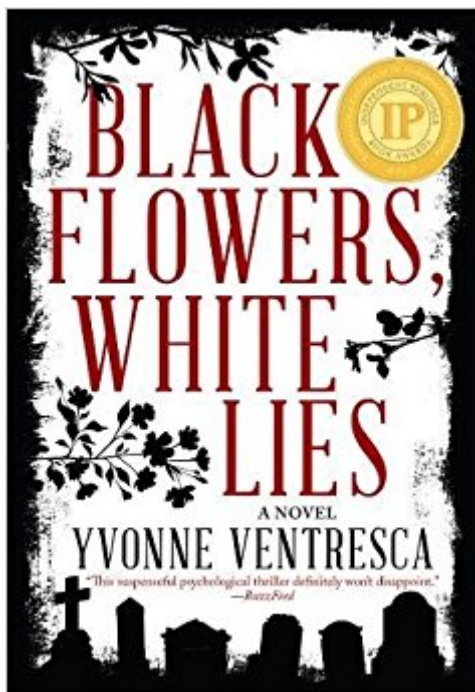


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Black Flowers, White Lies

When a handprint much like the one Ella left on her father's tombstone mysteriously appears on the bathroom mirror, at first she wonders if Dad is warning her of danger as he did once before. If it's not a warning, could her new too-good-to-be-true boyfriend be responsible for the strange occurrences? Or maybe it's the grieving building superintendent whose dead daughter strongly resembles Ella? As the unexplained events become more frequent and more sinister, Ella becomes terrified about who—or what—might harm her. Soon the evidence points to someone else entirely: Ella herself. What if, like her father, she's suffering from a breakdown? Gr 9 Up "In times of trouble, Ella's deep, almost supernatural connection to her deceased father (he died in a car accident before she was born) has brought her great comfort. When her mother remarries and her mysterious new stepbrother divulges that her father died in a mental hospital instead of on the road after heroically saving a sick animal, like she was told, she starts to spin out. Spooky things begin happening to and around Ella, leaving her and readers to wonder whether her father's restless spirit is trying to tell her something, or if his mental illness was passed down to his daughter. There are scary moments, and even readers who figure out early on that Ella's stepbrother might not be the most reliable source of information will be curious about how all of the "haunts" came to be. The plot seems drawn out, though, and there isn't a great deal of chemistry between any of the characters. Ella's despair that her father died in a mental hospital is understandable, but it's laid on thick, and by the final reveal, her intense relief strays into mental illness-stigmatizing territory. What's true and what's a lie? Where are the rare black flowers at Ella's dad's gravesite coming from? Why now is she discovering that she's been told white lies by her loving mother and friend? In addition, there are either much darker lies being told to Ella, or her sensitivity to the spirit world may be tipping her into mental illness. What's really going on in this riveting mystery? Fifteen year-old Ella finds out from her mom that her dear cat, Oscar, is not her original pet, but a younger replacement after Oscar's untimely death. A small white lie, perhaps. Then she hears from her older stepbrother that her father, who died before she was born, died not from a car accident, as she's been told her entire life, but from a drug overdose in a psychiatric hospital. Suddenly, Ella's previously secure life, her family, her friends, begins to tilt. Add in the new boy friend, whom Ella has begun to care a lot for and then drops her cold with no explanation, and Ella's not sure of anything anymore. If her father had a mental illness, maybe she could too. Throw in a dash of ghostly fatherly help seven years before, which Ella believed saved her life, and I couldn't put this book down! There are so many doubts about what is the truth. So many secrets are unfurled. A thrilling read! A personal plus for me is the setting where this compelling story unfolds. I live in Hoboken, New Jersey so what a treat to have familiar places and landmarks visited in the telling of this intriguing tale. If I could, I'd give a sixth star for featuring Hoboken!

In *Black Flowers, White Lies*, a high schooler is dealing with her mom's wedding, a soon-to-be stepbrother who happens to be hot, and some haunting truths about her father. At the same time, strange things are starting to happen all around her. Is her father communicating with her from the grave? I came into this story expecting suspense and got so much more. I can see why this author won the very coveted Crystal Kite Award for her previous book. She creates rich characters you

grow to care about deeply, coupled with a story that will draw you in from the start. Don't miss this one!

In keeping with its cover illustration, this novel opens in a cemetery. Ella is visiting the grave of the father she's never met, and her sadness permeates the reader's introduction to her like a mist and lingers through the pages. For the almost sixteen years of Ella's life, she's had only one utterly reliable person at her side: her mother. But in a few days, their two-person team is about to be broken up. Ella's mom is less than a week away from establishing her own new team; she's getting remarried. And as much as Mom tells Ella that no matter what, her daughter will always be Number One to her, Ella knows that as soon as Mom marries Stanley, things are going to start changing. In fact, the wedding hasn't even happened yet, and things are starting to change already. Ella and Mom have always talked to each other about Dad, but now when Ella brings up the subject, Mom seems impatient, as if she just wants to move on with her life. Easy for her! She's embarking on a new chapter, but Ella has never felt more alone or more vulnerable. From her perspective, it's not the perfect time for Stanley's son Blake, the new 18-year-old stepbrother Ella's never met before, to arrive from California as a houseguest, just before Mom and Stanley get married and then fly off to Paris for their honeymoon. It's not that Ella has no plans for the week. She's going to sleep at her friend Grace's house every night, and during the day she'll be continuing with her regular summer activities: working at Mom's bookstore in town and volunteering at the local animal shelter. And Blake seems friendly and considerate; he even seems to want to hang around with her sometimes while waiting for his freshman year to start at NYU. Everything is going okay until the night before the wedding, when Blake gets Ella alone and tells her that he wants the two of them to be completely honest with each other. And to set that course, he reveals a secret that Stanley has told him. Ella's dad didn't die in a car accident, as Ella's mom has always told her he did. He died as a patient in a psychiatric hospital. Mom would never have lied to Ella about something so important - would she? Why would Ella believe a stranger over her own mother? It's ridiculous. But Blake produces proof. And once Mom and Stanley leave for Paris, inexplicable things start happening to and around Ella. She's always believed in the supernatural to some extent, but these events are terrifying, and they leave her questioning not only Mom's truthfulness, but her own sanity. After all, isn't mental illness often hereditary? Ella goes through what feel like a lifetime of changes during the roughly two-week period that this book covers, but she never for a moment stops being a believable teen character, and the plot never bogs down. Your heart will be in your mouth as you gallop toward the conclusion, but you'll want to stay in the saddle every step of the way.

I was highly anticipating the next book by Crystal Kite award-winner Yvonne Ventresca, and I was not disappointed. I was originally drawn to her first novel, *Pandemic*, due to its... well, its pandemic. I like books about when society falls apart. So when I heard that her next book, *Black Flowers, White Lies*, was entirely different, I wondered how I'd feel about it. Well... I loved it. In some ways, there are common themes, because although society as a whole doesn't fall apart, the protagonist's world certainly starts to unravel. There's that same feeling of shifting ground and wondering where she's going to be able to turn. Really, the common theme between both is examining our fears. This is a captivating story of a girl facing unexplained events that shake her to her core, open up old wounds and make her wonder what's real. Is it madness or haunting? Ella is a regular New Jersey teenager. Her mom is about to remarry after a long time of it being just the two of them since Ella's father died when she was small. This common "every day" problem is underscored by the fact that strange things begin to happen in her world. Creepy signs begin to appear, and as the reader you start to wonder if we're dealing with an unreliable narrator. The author makes both options plausible so that you have to keep turning to find out if your guesses are correct. There is a boy, of course, and you aren't quite sure if he's friend or foe. There are some fun elements, like a tarot card reading I totally want to be in on, and Ella's love for animals.

Wow, what a gripping edge of your seat story! Ella is a very engaging character (and she loves cats!). The plot twists into the unexpected, and the supernatural, as Ella seeks the truth of her father's untimely death. All this leads to a thrilling climax. Very strongly recommended!

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
