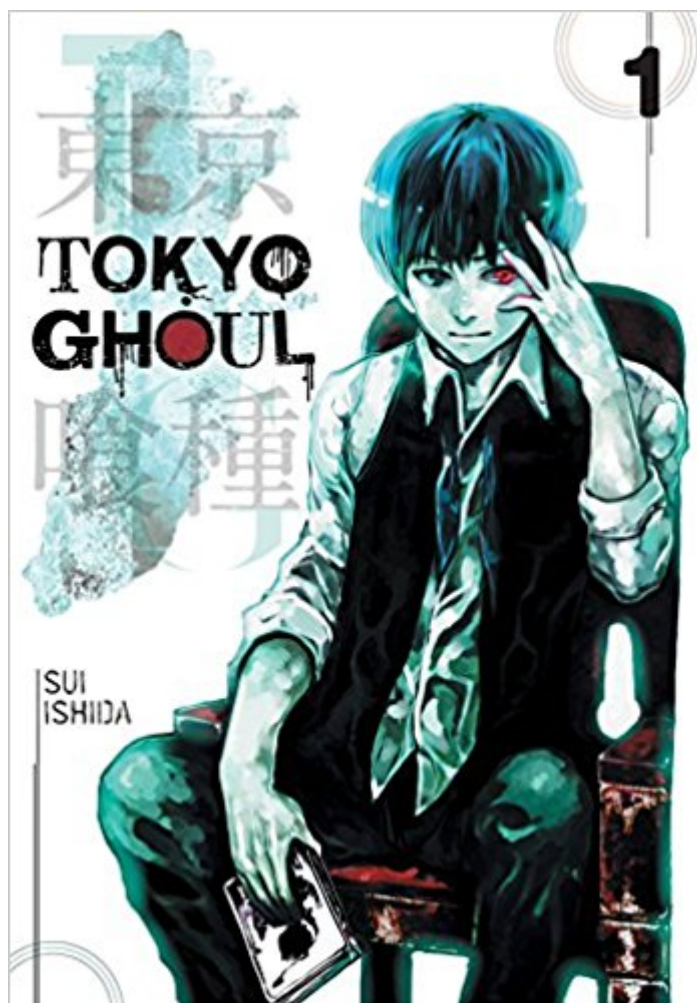


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Tokyo Ghoul, Vol. 1

Sui Ishida was born in Fukuoka, Japan. He is the author of Tokyo Ghoul and several Tokyo Ghoul one-shots, including one that won him second place in the Weekly Young Jump 113th Grand Prix award in 2010. Tokyo Ghoul began serialization in Weekly Young Jump in 2011 and was adapted into an anime series in 2014.

Ishida is amazing and there is so much symbolism in all of the panels be it with flowers, numbers and subtle hints and foreshadowing. Definitely a favorite and I can't wait to buy them all. This is supposed to be a preview of Volumes 1 and 2, but I'm not sure how much of each I actually read. Also, halfway through, there was a big "Warning: Spoilers" page, which completely confused me, since this is supposed to be Volumes 1 and 2, so what would the spoilers be? I've never read Volume 1 of a series and at the beginning of Volume 2 had a Spoilers warning. The series looked pretty interesting, but the layout and content of the book make no sense; I was looking for a new series to read, but this mess put me completely off of Tokyo Ghoul.

If you like tragedies and horror manga, this is the one for you. An amazing series by Ishida Sui. This author is great at building characters, forming parallels, foreshadowing (sometimes using Tarot card numbers hidden in the panels), symbolism using flowers, and making you think. He even references old Japanese authors like Kafka. I was on the edge of my seat every week waiting for new chapters to come out. Seriously, support the author and check this series out! It will not disappoint you.

A solid introduction to the manga, which - for whatever reason - I have been able to connect to far better than the anime. Early on, the two follow each other pretty faithfully, so if you've seen the series you know how this is going to begin.

Tokyo is one of the best mangas of all time. It is trust me. At around the halfway point it takes an insane turn which is why it was in the top 5 most sold manga last year. There is amazing foreshadowing in it that you may not notice because its so subtle. And even in this first volume there is foreshadowing for the sequel series Tokyo ghoul RE. Its that well written. And theres even foreshadowing for characters and events through the little things the author did which was draw numbers on characters or scenes which are supposed to represent tarot cards. So if you see a number on a page somewhere look up the tarot card and you might understand these very complex

characters a bit more. But this is mostly a thing in the latter volumes.

As an older manga reader who has fallen out of manga, this was one last purchase for me at trying a new series. It was worth it, I felt this was a good story and worth the purchase. I'm not saying I'd follow this if it went into anime, but I may keep up with the manga if I can. For some reason I just can't get into manga as I used to, but this was a story worth reading and I'm curious to see how it goes in the future.

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
